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## Swiss Club Camping and Visit to Goat Cheese Farm

For those of us whose entire knowledge of goats derived from movies like "Heidi," the visit to Harley Farm came as a surprise. In the movies, goats are always depicted as cute, harmless furry animals. No movie ever mentioned the assault of smells that greeted us at the farm, or the endless mines on the ground, which we tried to avoid at first, and then gave up on. Furthermore, most of us didn't expect to be immediately surrounded—and munched!—by a mob of goats...
